#### 1 ACCOUNTANT'S COMPILATION REPORT

The financial statements of International Association of Internet Hotlines - INHOPE at Amsterdam have been compiled by us using the information provided by you. The financial statements comprise the balance sheet as at December 31, 2018 and the profit and loss account for the year 2018 with the accompanying explanatory notes. These notes include a summary of the accounting policies which have been applied.

The standard requires us to assist you in the preparation and presentation of the financial statements in accordance with RJK-C1 "small non-profit organisations". Therefore, we have conducted our work, in accordance with the applicable regulations, on the assumption that you have fulfilled your responsibility. To conclude our work, we have read the financial statements as a whole to consider whether the financial statements as presented correspond with our understanding of International Association of Internet Hotlines - INHOPE We have not performed any audit or review procedures which would enable us to express an opinion or a conclusion as to the fair presentation of the financial statements.

# **DIRECTORS' REPORT**



### **INHOPE Association – Directors Report (Audit 2018)**

The Directors report is a summary of INHOPE's main activities and achievements during 2018. INHOPE is the International Association of Internet Hotlines, which is registered in the Netherlands. INHOPE's mission is to support and enhance the work of Hotlines towards strengthening International efforts in combating online Child Sexual Abuse Material. INHOPE's vision is an internet free of Child Sexual Abuse Material.

2018 was a year of change, challenge and development for the organisation. During 2018 I was elected as President of INHOPE along with a new Board of Directors by a vote of members at the Annual General Meeting held in Crete, Greece in June 2018 in accordance with the Articles of Association. I would like to thank the previous Board members and acknowledge all of the work done during their tenure. I would especially like to thank my predecessor Ms. Arda Gerkens (previous President).

The INHOPE Board appointed Denton Howard as Executive Director leading the Secretariat in March 2018. He has worked with INHOPE for 14 years in a variety of roles, brings vast experience to the role and has led the organisation through 2018.

INHOPE moved office in Amsterdam due to lease expiration. The new office is much better suited to INHOPE's needs and is located at 270-300 Bos en Lommerplein, 1055 RW, Amsterdam.

As INHOPE's core business involves the exchange of data - GDPR and its requirements had extreme potential implications and significant related costs. INHOPE appointed an independent Data Protection Officer who in coordination with the INHOPE Board, Executive Director and Secretariat achieved compliance by GDPR deadline.

INHOPE's income which was overall in-line with expectation, comes primarily from three main sources (European Commission projects, Membership fees & INHOPE partner program). Expenditure was carefully controlled in order to improve the core strength of INHOPE. Overall financial performance was in line with expectation.

European Commission projects (LOT1 & LOT2) are a major source of funding for INHOPE. 2018 is a midpoint in both of these multi-year projects and all deliverables were achieved and INHOPE looks forward to completing these projects on schedule during 2019.

The INHOPE partner program has grown in line with plans. The high point of this was the first INHOPE Summit which was held in Microsoft HQ in Seattle where existing and potential partner organisations came together to learn about INHOPE and what we do. This resulted in new partners in 2018 and will support efforts in future years. This event will be an annual event going forward.

Overall 2018 was a productive and successful year for the INHOPE Association. Looking forward into 2019 INHOPE will explore opportunities to expand globally, to increase its funding base, to renew its LOT1 & 2 projects with the European Commission and work towards our vision of an internet free of Child Sexual Abuse Material.

## **3 GENERAL NOTES**

#### **Most important activities**

The activities of International Association of Internet Hotlines - INHOPE, having its legal seat at Amsterdam primarily consist of:

- -The objectives of the Association are to facilitate and promote the work of INHOPE Member Hotlines, whose work is to eradicate illegal content, primarily child sexual abuse material, on the internet.
- Generating profits for the purpose of distributing the same among the members shall not be permitted.

#### **Location actual activities**

The registered and actual address of International Association of Internet Hotlines - INHOPE is Bos en Lommerplein 270, 1055 RW, Amsterdam in Registered place of business and is registered at the chamber of commerce under number 34124277.

# **Group structure**

International Association of Internet Hotlines - INHOPE has certain control over Stichting INHOPE Foundation. In accordance with C1.401 of RJK C1 'small non profit organisations' consolidated accounts are not drawn up.



#### 4 ACCOUNTING POLICIES

#### **GENERAL**

#### **General policies**

The financial statements have been prepared in accordance with Dutch GAAP RJK C1 'small non profit organisations'.

# Accounting policies for the valuation of assets and equity and liabilities

Assets and liabilities are generally valued at historical cost, production cost or at fair value at the time of acquisition. If no specific valuation principle has been stated, valuation is at historical cost.

The valuation principles and method of determining the result are the same as those used in the previous year.

#### Accounting policies for the income statement

The result is the difference between the realisable value of the goods/services provided and the costs and other charges during the year. The results on transactions are recognised in the year in which they are realised.

### Foreign currency translation

Foreign currency transactions occurring during the financial year are recognised in the financial statements at exchange rates prevailing on the transaction date. Exchange rate differences are recorded in the income and expenditure statement.

### **ACCOUNTING POLICIES FOR ASSETS**

#### Property, plant and equipment

Tangible fixed assets are valued at historical cost or production cost including directly attributable costs, less straight-line depreciation based on the expected future life and impairments.

#### Receivables

Receivables are initially valued at the fair value of the consideration to be received, including transaction costs if material. Receivables are subsequently valued at the amortised cost price. Provisions for bad debts are deducted from the carrying amount of the receivable.

Provisions deemed necessary for doubtful accounts are deducted. These provisions are determined by individual assessment of the receivables.

#### Cash and Bank

Cash at banks and in hand represent cash in hand, bank balances and deposits with terms of less than twelve months. Cash at banks and in hand is carried at nominal value.

#### **ACCOUNTING POLICIES FOR EQUITY AND LIABILITIES**

#### **Current liabilities**

On initial recognition current liabilities are recognised at fair value. After initial recognition current liabilities are recognised at the amortised cost price, being the amount received, taking into account premiums or discounts, less transaction costs. This usually is the nominal value.

#### **ACCOUNTING POLICIES FOR THE INCOME STATEMENT**

#### **Income**

Income and expenses are accounted for on an accrual basis. Income is recorded when realised. Losses originating before the end of the financial year are taken into account if they have become known before preparation of the financial statements. The result is based on the difference between income and expenses.



Grants are given to cover specific and overhead expenses. Grant income is recorded in the year that the related expenses occur. For grants received for which the expenses have not yet occurred, a deferred income (grants received in advance) is accounted for.

Regarding the recording of the LOT 1 and 2, income is recognized based on the total result of the project. If a project is expected to result in a loss, this loss will be accounted for as soon as this loss is foreseeable. If a project is expected to result in a profit, this profit will be amortized during the project term.

#### **Expenses**

Expenses are recorded when they occur or when they are foreseeable provided that the cost is related to the current financial year or can be allocated to a specific project.

Personnel has been granted a pension scheme. This is a scheme, where personnel can select a pension insurance company of choice and in which a percentage of their gross wages is transferred to an insurance company.

#### **Corporation tax**

On September 13, 2012 the Dutch tax authorities declared that International Association of Internet Hotlines - INHOPE is not subject to corporation tax.

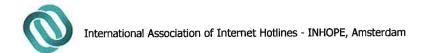

#### **Income**

#### LOT 1 and 2 (second phase)

These projects concern Digital Service Infrastructure for making a better and safer internet for kids. The main aim of this second phase is to continue improving the platform and services delivered in de first phase of both LOT 1 and LOT 2 projects. International Association of Internet Hotlines - INHOPE is the leading partner of LOT 2 and the subcontractor of EUN for LOT 1.

LOT 1 started in October 2016 and will finish in May 2019. The total grant amounts to € 395,999.

LOT 2 started in November 2016 and will finish in July 2019. The total grant amounts to € 1,199,995.

The direct costs consist of material costs and employee costs. For the allocation of employee costs the Association does not use a time registration system. The employee costs are allocated to LOT 1 and 2 based on approved rates by the grant giver and number of months employed of the employees in relation to budgeted months per specific phase of the project.

During 2018, employee costs for an amount of  $\in$  84,196 (2017:  $\in$  70,894) are allocated to LOT 1 and to LOT 2 an amount of  $\in$  80,408 (2017  $\in$  64,820).
